



Shitehawk Reep 2013 acrylic on canvas 76 × 76 cm




THE ANIMAL IN US ALL

Like the hybrid characters that live in Rona Green's world, heavily adorned with tattoo markings, so too are the walls of our home. Every spare piece of wall is laden with Rona's part-human, part-animal depictions that watch over us, constantly reminding us to question identity and look beyond the cover.

Her work talks about society and the individuals that exist within it. In one piece we are drawn to a reclusive cat, introverted and mysterious, painted in steely tones, standing stoic with a few significant tattoos, and we connect to the loner within us. This creature counsels us on the benefits of quiet reflection, to be considered and less reactive in our every day dealings.

On another wall is perched an image of a bold rooster, charismatic with a brilliant pronged comb, recklessly smoking a cigarette like a badge of honor. The

extrovert.We are prompted by this oddity to take the plunge, venture into the unknown, and to bear in mind that life is not a dress rehearsal.

Being animal lovers, we immediately identified with Rona's work. Her whimsical portraits of bad ass dogs with black eyes and menacing bunnies that shouldn't be trusted, despite their rough past, still all seem to exude

For us, Rona's art is a study of the eccentric personalities we chance upon in our life, and it reminds us to celebrate difference by exercising tolerance and acceptance.
